

NOTES FROM YOUR EDITOR

Summer is drawing to a close, and with the coming of Fall many Chapters will be pausing in their camping activities. However, work for the NSDCA



continues year-round: we have two new State Representatives, and new Board members were installed at this year's Camporee. The Treasurers introduce themselves in their column on page 7, and the Vice Presidents introduction may be found on page 25 of the previous issue (Summer, Volume 59 Issue 3). I have the pleasure of introducing Michigan State Representatives Gary and Alberta Gunsell, and Illinois State Representatives Lawrence and Ruthann Sanders.

Michigan State Representatives Gary and Alberta were 'almost neighbors' in their rural neighborhood. They married in 1974 and took square dance lessons because both of their parents square danced and they thought it would be something they could all do together. They danced for about seven years and then took a long break while raising their son. Later



they took a refresher course and joined a club in Durand, MI, where there was talk about camping. As the Gunsells have been camping since they were youngsters, this got their interest, and they joined the Northwood Stompers (#121) in 2002.

Gary retired in 2018 from the City of Linden where he was a DPW worker. He also worked for Shac Heating & AC and Meritor Automotive. Alberta retired in 2020 from Genesee County Health Department as a Clerical Coordinator. She also worked at the Sheriff's Department, Planning Commission and Purchasing Department during her years with the county. They camp and square dance in the summer in Michigan as much as possible and spend their winters in Arizona.

Some of the positions they have held during their square dancing years are: President, Vice President and Treasurer for their local club; Vendor Chairman for the National Convention (held in Detroit, Michigan); Michigan Square & Round Dance Council (current); Chairman for the Michigan State Convention; and have served multiple years as Chairman for the NSDCA Michigan Camporee.

As Michigan Representatives they are hoping to help build the number of participants in Square Dancing. They also would like to get more people to participate in the NSDCA International Camporee and campouts.

Illinois State Representatives Lawrence and Ruthann Sanders began camping in 1967 and started square dancing in 1970. They joined the Illi-

ana Square Wheelers (#044) in 1973 and are current officers in the chapter. However, since most chapter members no longer camp and several live out of the area, they only get together socially. They've held all the officer positions with the Square Wheelers and at the state level have served on the Board of Directors several times, including being state president.



Nationally the Sanders have chaired one and co-chaired at least two NSDCA International Camporees as well as helping with multiple others. They attended their first International Camporee in Bowling Green, KY in 1974, and numerous ones since. They were the North Central Representative in the 80s and 90s, and served on the NSDCA National Board of Directors from 1995 through 2006, including six years as NSDCA President.

Lawrence and Ruthann were married 60 years ago and have lived in the same town since. They are active members of their church: Lawrence is an Elder and served as Church Board President in the early 70s; Ruthann is a member of the Woman's Guild. They have two children: a daughter and a son; both kids graduated from square dance classes by the age of 10.

Lawrence retired from Illinois Bell/Ameritech/SBC after 40 years in 1996. He is also a life member of the AMVETS, a nationally recognized veterans' organization, serving as State Commander in 1995-96. His hobbies include camping, square dancing, traveling, and watching TV.

Ruthann attended Nursing School right out of high school and became a Registered Nurse in 1959. She worked in various settings both full and part time, depending on family situation, until completely retiring in 2017. In 1978 she obtained her BS in Health Arts and became certified in School Nursing. In 1992 she retired from a guaranteed pay job after she and a friend started their own company doing contract services for schools, mainly vision and hearing screenings. That company was dissolved in 2017. She considers herself an organizational junkie, at one time being a member of around six nursing organizations. She belongs to the AMVETS Ladies Auxiliary and currently serves as the State Parliamentarian. Ruthann is an avid reader, enjoys camping, square dancing, and traveling.



The benefit of having a TPMS and Roadside Assistance

I magine the following scenario: You're traveling along a backroad, far from any large city, and you develop a flat tire on your tandem axle trailer 40 miles from your destination. Also imagine you don't have an after-market tire pressure monitoring system (TPMS) on your trailer tires and are totally unaware you've lost a tire, so you keep driving. A while later, as dusk is approaching and a heavy drizzle begins to fall, another car passes you and beeps, the passenger pointing back towards the trailer and mouthing "flat tire". You find a safe place to pull over and discover one tire has totally disintegrated, the tread separated and tore up the wheel well causing several thousand dollars' worth of damage to your travel trailer. Fortunately you have a spare tire; unfortunately the mechanic who put the last set of tires on your trailer torqued them down so tight you are unable to break the lug nuts free. Also imagine you don't have a roadside assistance plan that covers issues with your travel trailer. What do you do?

This scenario is real - it happened to us - but we had a TPMS and were alerted almost immediately to a loss of tire pressure, so we were able to find a place to pull over and there was no need for another driver to point out the problem. As we pulled over almost immediately, the tire did not self-destruct and no damage to the trailer occurred. However, it was dusk and late fall, so the light faded quickly. And it was raining – a lot heavier than a drizzle. While I was unable to determine why the tire lost air pressure, an independent check with a gauge showed the tire was not capable of being used. Since we had a roadside assistance plan with Good Sam, we phoned the 800 number, told them the problem and gave them our location. They indicated since we were at such a remote location, they might have an issue finding someone to come help us. After about 30 minutes they called us back and informed us a wrecker would be arriving in about an hour. After the requisite arrival time came and went, we called Good Sam back and they gave us the phone number of the outfit that had dispatched a truck so we could determine when they would arrive. When we contacted the tow truck company, they told us they opted to not accept the call as we were so remote. Unfortunately, they neglected to inform the Good Sam dispatcher, so once again we waited for them to contact another towing outfit to see if they would come help us. We were lucky this time; we got their phone number from the dispatcher and called, and within the hour a tow truck pulled up behind us (with the rain still coming down, but fortunately now just a drizzle) and 45 minutes later we were on the road. We finally got to our destination at 10 p.m., five hours behind schedule, but we were safe and sound. Before we continued on our travls we got a new set of four tires.

If we didn't have the TPMS we could have suffered serious damage to the trailer when the tread finally separated from the tire. Additionally, if we didn't have roadside service, we'd have been stuck by the side of the road waiting for a good Samaritan to eventually stop and offer help (only one passerby did offer help, but that was about 10 minutes before the tow truck was scheduled to arrive – we politely declined as we knew he was coming since we had talked to the driver while he was enroute).

There are many after-market TPMS systems to choose from. Some are limited based on the number of sensors or maximum cold tire pressure, others are limited based on signal strength – but might come with (or have as an option) a signal booster. This is of concern for long trailers, where the trailer's tires are more than 20 feet from the tow vehicle's cab where the TPMS monitor is situated. Speaking of the monitor, some brands offer a separate piece of hardware while others require you to put an app on your phone. Some TPMS systems have all sorts of user-definable setpoints, while others have only a few (or none at all). Be sure to do your homework before investing in a TPMS system, as they can range from about \$150 to several hundred dollars.

As for roadside assistance plans, there are also many to choose from, but what they cover (or won't cover) is sometimes difficult to decipher. Our Good Sam plan covers both the trailer and truck; they'll tow either or both if required to the closest service facility. Others (like AAA's plan) is an add-on policy to their regular coverage, but is limited in scope and doesn't apply to fifth wheel trailers. Numerous insurance companies offer a plan that covers the trailer and has roadside assistance as an additional cost rider. Again, do your homework. But to paraphrase the old American Express commercial, "Don't leave home without them." Just like your insurance, you hope you never need to be alerted by the TPMS and you hope to never have to use the roadside assistance, but if you ever do need them, you'll be glad you have them.

The hospital has formed a partnership with Trademark Metals Recycling. If you turn in any size tabs and any all-aluminum cans to one of their facilities, you can earmark the donation to Shriners Hospitals.

Trademark Metals will transfer that amount and also contribute an extra 50 cents for each dollar donated. There are 1,400 tabs in a pound. From April 2002 to January 2019 over \$150,000 was donated to Shriners Hospitals
