




This is my last article before our 2022 International Camporee in Rockville, Indiana. The Camporee team has put together a great event in a truly unusual location. Nowhere else in the entire world can you find this many wooden covered bridges in such a small geographic area.

The Camporee's official dates are from Tuesday, June 14th to Thursday, June 16th, but the team has added a Trails End Dance on Monday night which is free to registered guests. They have also added a Trails Through to the Evansville Dance for Friday night June 17th, and we just added Susan Wolford to cue rounds for this dance.

The Parke County 4-H Fairgrounds Campground will accept entrance on Monday June 12 and you have to leave by noon on Sunday the 19th.

But where are you going to go? The National Square Dance Convention in Evansville, Indiana doesn't start until Wednesday June 22nd. How about exploring Indianapolis? There are lots of things to do there, and it's only about 60 miles from Rockville.

Start with a tour of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway; it offers a great museum and tours of the race course. Or maybe the Indianapolis Zoo or Art Museum. or the Indiana State Museum ... all great ways to spend a nice day.

But Indianapolis offers some more unusual options, how about Action Duckpin Bowling or an honest to goodness old fashioned Drive Inn Movie Theater? 

Interview with a Caller: Herb Edwards

This is the second installment in the interview series of callers and cuers that make our camping square dancing events possible. Please see the list of questions to pose to your favorite caller/cuer on page 57 of the Spring 2021 *TIMES* (Vol. 59 Issue 2).

Back in 1975, Herb was a new single father of three, and he joined a group called "Parents without Partners." Before long, some of the group decided to learn square dancing. Even though he wasn't sure square dancing would be of interest, it was something to do with the group, so he went along. A caller, Paul Helmig, was just starting a new

dance class – so that was how it all began. A few months after graduation Herb commented to Paul that he thought anyone could memorize a few songs and be thus a caller. The challenge was on! Paul loaned him a couple of records to learn and call at the next dance. Herb found that wasn't so tough, but he had no idea how much more he had to learn. Before long, he gathered a group of friends and began to teach square dancing, with a lot of encouragement and help from Paul Helmig of course. His



course was set; there was no turning back now!

In 1982, Herb married another square dance enthusiast, Pat, and they've been a team ever since. They've traveled throughout the central United States and, at the request of his granddaughter, even taught square dancing to a grade school class in Florida. Over the past 45 years Herb has called for many Central Illinois Square Dance Clubs. A few years back, when square dancing was a much more popular form of entertainment, he would sometimes teach classes for two to three clubs in one year. Unfortunately, many of these clubs are no longer active.

Herb and Pat have attended every Illinois State Square Dance Convention since they began in 1983. Herb and Pat were both involved with many facets of these conventions including sound systems and fashion shows.

Herb is still doing some traveling and is the regular club caller for the "Twin City Twirlers" in Bloomington, IL. Life got more exciting in 1992 when Herb and Pat joined the Swing N Travelers, NSDCA Chapter 123. They have attended and called at many of the International Camporees and most all of the State Camporees since then. He became the club caller for NSDCA Chapter 123 in 1992. This chapter has been active and growing since it began in 1981. What could be more fun than camping, and square dancing with good friends and traveling to NSDCA Camporees to greet more good friends from across the country?

The object of the NSDCA shall be to provide an opportunity for and to encourage those interested in square dancing and camping to:

- a) Combine these two activities for mutual enjoyment.
- b) Permit each member the opportunity of sharing in the responsibility of membership.
- c) Promote interest in square dancing and camping.
- d) Promote Square Dance Camporees as may be decided upon by the membership.

Helpful Hints: Towing Safety

E veryone that has a travel trailer tows, while those in motorhomes may or may not have a "toad" (the vehicle that is towed behind so the motorhome doesn't have to be used as the primary transport vehicle once you're at the campsite). Here are several things to do and think about whenever you get ready to tow another vehicle to help ensure you have the safest trip possible:

- 1. Plan ahead: Knowing where your destination is, the roads you are going to travel to get there, and the overall parameters of your RV (e.g., height, length, weight) is key to a safe trip. Extremely sharp turns, narrow roads, high crosswinds and steep inclines can present a challenge for towing. By planning ahead, you can potentially avoid road construction, heavy traffic and other issues that could make your driving experience an unpleasant one. Many GPS units also provide traffic updates and redirection; you need to ensure that it does not steer you into a different kind of maneuvering difficulty (such as a low overpass or narrow passage). When traveling in the mountains and approaching a steep grade, schedule a brake check at a rest stop before you get to the steep grade. I use a combination of Google Maps, the Good Sam Trip Planner and the AAA Route Planner to map out our intended travels, recognizing that situations change and my plans do not always play out as desired. I also use historical travel time values to determine where I will be at a given time versus relying on the values presented by the aforementioned computer-based tools; this helps me plan to avoid big city rush hour traffic.
- 2. <u>Tire monitoring</u>: An improperly inflated tire can negatively affect handling and cause more rolling resistance, which increases the tire's temperature and may be a contributing factor to a blowout. Having a flat tire or a blowout is a common dangerous situation while towing, whether the tire issue on the tow vehicle (e.g., truck or motorhome) or the trailer/toad. Not only could an incident like this lead to a potential loss of vehicle control, but if tread separation occurs substantial damage can be inflicted on the vehicle with the damaged tire.

A tire pressure monitoring system (TPMS) such as described briefly in the Spring and Fall 2021 issues of the *TIMES* is a useful tool for alerting you to a low-pressure situation. Many tow vehicles have a factory-supplied TPMS built into the tire rim; for the toad there may be a factory-installed TPMS, but it would not alert the driver in the motorhome, therefore an aftermarket TPMS would be required for the toad or trailer. The aftermarket TPMS sensor is a little cap that screws onto the valve stem (it's best to have a metal valve stem versus rubber) and communicates either with a dedicated monitor display mounted near the driver or an app on the phone. The TPMS continually monitors the tires' pressure and temperature and will sound an alert when certain limits are exceeded.

Having a TPMS is just one good practice; doing a pre-travel inspec-

tion of your tires is another, as it can help you spot a potential problem before you hit the road. Check all tire pressures (remember, it's always best to do this before you start your travel as you are then looking at "cold" temperatures – never let air out of the tire to meet the cold pressure after you have been driving and the tires have warmed up) and look for any visible chinks, cracks or objects in the sidewall; also check for objects in the visible part of the tread. Each time you stop for a break it is also a good habit to walk around your rig to check for visible signs of tire trouble, and if you have an infrared (IR) temperature "gun" then also check the tires' sidewall and hub temperatures. The values for all the tires will not be the same, and the side facing the sun could be 10 degrees or more warmer, but if there is a large discrepancy on the same side then further investigation may be warranted. Most tire failures are due to overheating or sidewall stressing resulting from excessive speed, underinflation and/or overloading. Be sure to follow the each vehicle's manufacturer recommendations for cold tire inflation pressures to minimize problems and promote long tire life. Remember, tires that are not properly inflated can negatively affect handling.

- 3. Don't exceed your tow vehicle limits: Every tow vehicle manufacturer publishes a model year-specific "tow guide" that states the maximum weight of a towed vehicle the towing vehicle should be able to handle. Unfortunately, the testing that is done to determine this maximum weight is typically not oriented towards the RV market but a user who hauls using a flatbed trailer. It is a useful guide, but not the deciding factor to assess safety. The tow vehicle's certified gross combined vehicle weight rating (GCVWR) is also usually listed in the tow guide as well as the owner's manual. This value provides the maximum combined weight of the tow vehicle and the towed vehicle. It is a federally mandated requirement, and in the event of an accident can be legally used against you in a court of law if you have exceeded the certified value. Ensuring you are under the GCVWR does not mean you are driving and towing safely, but if you are over the GCVWR then you certainly are not driving and towing safely. The only way to absolutely know where you stand with respect to the GCVWR (and for that matter, the gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of the tow vehicle and trailer/toad or the tongue or pin weight of the trailer) is to get actual weight values from a certified scale (such as CAT, found at many truck stops). The cost is minimal, but the peace of mind it provides knowing you are not violating weight restrictions is invaluable.
- 4. <u>Drive within your limits</u>: Did you get a good night's sleep? Did you have a disagreement with someone at the campground or your spouse that has upset you? Remember, you as the driver of your RV need to be alert and fully focused on the task at hand; distractions that let your mind

wander or issues (like a lack of sleep) that can affect your response time could prove to be a contributing factor in an accident or your response to a tire blowout. My wife and I typically swap driving responsibilities every two hours; sometimes the trade is made at a rest stop, while other times we exit the highway and find a safe place to stop (e.g., shopping center parking lot, truck stop parking lot, gas station). I plan our travel days to cover around 300 miles, which is roughly six to seven hours behind the wheel (we tend to average 45 to 50 mph, even on the interstate highway, but this value includes our stops for fuel, food and rest). This is all part of the preplanning described in the first item.

- 5. Maintain a safe distance: Towing a travel trailer or toad means you won't be able to easily change lanes at the spur of the moment to avoid a traffic issue, and it is going to take you longer to come to a full stop. As the driver, it is your responsibility to ensure that you have ample room to stop without ramming the vehicle in front of you; this means you need extra room between you and that other vehicle to have a safe following distance. It is unfortunate that most people do not understand the issues we face while driving our RVs; they dart in and out of traffic and sometimes cut us off. We must remain alert to these inconsiderate drivers and adjust our car driving habits to accommodate our current mode of transportation, which sometimes puts us at a disadvantage in how we wish to travel with the flow of traffic. Regardless, an avoidable accident involving you is a good way to ruin a vacation.
- 6. Be careful changing lanes: Changing lanes in general is a higher-risk activity than driving while remaining in a single lane. The magnitude of this task is amplified while towing a trailer or toad because your blind spots are larger and you need more room and time to make a lane change. Make sure your side view mirrors are adjusted to create a clear view that extends to the end of the trailer/toad: the mirrors allow you to see more of your RV and the surrounding areas. While the mirrors provided with motorhomes are usually sufficient, if your tow vehicle didn't come with factory-equipped towing mirrors you should investigate adding mirror extenders. Pay attention to how your towed vehicle responds when changing lanes (i.e., how well it tracks the tow vehicle) and ensure you make accommodations for its behavior while changing lanes or making turns. As always, you should be looking further down the road so you can plan your turns and/or lane changes as soon as possible to allow sufficient time after signaling before you start your lane change/turn.
- 7. <u>Limit trailer sway</u>: Trailer sway, or the fishtailing of the towed trailer/toad, can be caused by many factors, among them improper loading of the trailer (resulting in low tongue weight), high cross winds, or excessive speed. Trailer sway is more common with bumper-pull vehicles, but

any of you have experienced the new look and feel of our NSDCA website. Webmaster Bob Summers has done a magnificent job of streamlining the site and giving it a clean, crisp look. Recently Bob has add



the site and giving it a clean, crisp look. Recently Bob has added current forms for membership renewal (both individual and bulk) and added a link to make easy viewing of the experimental camping map.

The Camping/Dancing menu item has two types of entries: Campouts and Other, each also has two sub-category entries: Campouts and Submit Campout Information for the former, and Chapters and Camporees for the latter. The Campouts sub-category entry provides a scrollable list of all currently provided campouts on the left, while the right margin provides links to the schedule information in a ready-to-print format, a link to add campouts to the list, and a link (in the form of a button) to the experimental campout map. The Submit Campout Information entry provides a brief discussion on how to use the submission process and a button on the left margin ("Show the Forms") to take you to the first information entry screen. Remember, all campout notification entries and revisions should now be provided through the NSDCA website, not by email.

The *Chapters* sub-category entry provides a list of all active NSDCA chapters and the state or province where they are located. Some chapters also have hyperlinks to their own webpages; if your chapter has a website and is not represented with a link, please contact webmaster Bob Summers (see page 51) with the appropriate information. There are also State association links at the lower right margin. The *Camporee* sub-category entry provides registration forms for the upcoming International NSDCA Camporee as well as a link to guidelines on how to go about hosting an International Camporee.

Board and Staff contact information is listed under the *Board & Staff* entry under *People*, while the *State & Area Representatives* entry provides contacts for those positions.

I have received little feedback on the experimental map (menu item Camping/Dancing ⇒ Campouts and look for the Maps button under the Visit Campouts heading in the right margin). Is this something that is worthwhile maintaining – in other words, do you find it useful in planning your camping expeditions to visit other chapters or find out what's planned along a route you will be traveling? Please let me know. And as always, if you spot an error on the web pages or in the campout listings – let me know. They don't fix themselves! Thank you.

Remember, if you would like someone included/remembered in the "We Remember Our Friends" section, please let us know their name, important dates, chapter name and number, and one or two important things about them. And please provide a high-resolution photo if one is available. Thank you.



Chicken Eggplant Parmesan Casserole

Ingredients:

1 small eggplant (~1 lb.), cut into 1/4" slices

4 Tbsp. olive oil

1 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breast

2 cups spaghetti sauce (or crushed tomatoes)

1/2 lb. fresh Mozzarella cheese, cut into thin slices

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese

1 Tbsp. Italian seasoning

salt and black pepper (to taste)

Steps:

- 1) Set oven to broil.
- 2) Arrange the eggplant in a single layer on a large baking sheet.
- 3) Coat both sides of the eggplant with 2.5 Tbsp. of the olive oil and season (to taste) with salt and pepper.
- 4) Broil, turning once, until brown (about 5 minutes per side).
- 5) Remove the eggplant from the oven.
- 6) Turn off the broiler and heat the oven to 425°F.
- 7) In a large nonstick frying pan, heat 1 Tbsp. of olive oil over a moderately high heat.
- 8) Season (to taste) the chicken with salt, pepper and Italian seasoning.
- 9) Partially cook the chicken, 2 minutes per side, and remove the chicken from the pan.
- 10) When cool, cut chicken crosswise into 1/4" slices.
- 11) Oil an 8" baking dish and put 1/3 of the eggplant in a single layer at the bottom of the dish.
- 12) Top the eggplant with 1/2 the chicken, 1/2 the tomato sauce, 1/2 the Mozzarella cheese and 1/3 of the Parmesan cheese.
- 13) Make another layer with 1/3 of the eggplant, the remaining chicken, tomatoes and Mozzarella cheese.
- 14) Add another 1/3 of the Parmesan cheese.
- 15) Top with the remaining eggplant and sprinkle with the remaining Parmesan cheese.
- 16) Drizzle with the remaining 1/2 Tbsp. of olive oil.
- 17) Bake for 20 minutes. Let sit for five minutes before cutting and serving.

Makes 4 servings: ~638 calories/serving. Reheats well.



it can also occur with fifth wheel trailers. For bumper-pull trailers, using a reputable weight distribution anti-sway hitch properly matched to the trailer will assist in minimizing (and possibly even damping) most sway. Recognizing trailer sway, being attuned to the situations that can cause it, and knowing how to minimize it make for a safer trip. All trailers over a certain minimum weight must have independent brakes, while all toads have a braking system that (with proper modifications) can be operated by the motorhome. The tow vehicle should have either a factory-installed or aftermarket brake controller that manages the towed vehicles brake system. If you sense trailer/toad sway, the first thing to do is to let up on the accelerator – but do not hit the tow vehicle's brakes; this might cause the towed vehicle to oscillate wildly and create further problems. Use the brake controller's manual override to apply the towed vehicle's brakes; once the towed vehicle has straightened out (i.e., sway has stopped) you can then apply the tow vehicle's brakes to safely stop the vehicles and to check for any issues.
