Well never mind, at my age I have even forgotten the old sayings.

However, telling people about square dancing and camping as a combined event does need some kind of old adage to get the message out. In today's world, there are literally hundreds of ways to communicate. Of course, many of us use Facebook or Twitter and, of course, emails to friends, but all of those methods are limited to the ring of people you have shared with in those formats. Those folks have already heard about your weekend or midweek campouts and square dancing. I am sure that you have talked it up as so much fun it should be taxed, so why aren't they joining you?

We need to expand to the others that we don't know and get their interest in such a great activity. My wife and I discovered that when you wear your club badges, particularly if you have a couple hundred camporee tags added, it really generates some interest from people you meet in the grocery store line, at Walmart, or when you are out to eat. People like to remember the time that they square danced in school for PE. Many have told me that their mom and dad were square dancers back in the 50s and 60s and a few have said that they were dragged to the dances because the parents didn't want to pay for a babysitter. We need those people to get back to that same feeling. Many times at our square dances we will invite the non-dancers to join us and we have a short class on circle left, allemande left, dosado and a few other calls; they have a blast. Once last year my corner carried a baby on her right hip during the whole dance!

Unfortunately, for some Chapters we are starting to drift down to less than a square that dances, and that is sad.

There are other places to get you message out: on Facebook click on Groups, then click on the magnifying glass and in the search area type Square Dance—you'll find lots of groups, and one or two are mine. But there is a whole world of contacts that we could be using to get the word out; you might even have one of those in your area.

Wheresthedance.com is another great place to get your square dance campouts listed. NSDCA has a special notice on their website. It is fairly easy to list your 2023 square dance dates, if you need help send me an email and I will show you how. Each year for several years I have loaded the dance schedule for 7 or 8 groups including mine, Chapter #123.

You can also look at wheresthedance.com and search for clubs near you or when traveling. Everybody enjoys meeting new square dancers. You may have a square dance club near you and they may have just bought an RV; never know till you look.

Maybe you could invite club members that you find on wheresthedance.com to come to YOUR square dance. We have had several drop by after finding out we were having a dance near them. In August,

we invited weekly square dance clubs from around the vicinity where we camped and ended up with 48 people at our dance. It was a fantastic time that everyone enjoyed.

Make plans now for the July 11 to 13 International Camporee in Lebanon, TN. Make a caravan of it and talk about it all the way there and back.

Publicity of this activity and this format of the NSDCA is everyone's job. It truly is a USE it or LOSE it thing.


196 Wabash Valley Wheel-a-Rounds; Indiana/Illinois

NOTES FROM YOUR EDITOR

In late October we were merrily driving down US-92 in Florida, headed to the Florida State Camporee. We stopped at a traffic light, and when it turned green I put my foot on the gas to slowly accelerate through



the intersection. At that moment there was a very loud BANG. Initially I thought it was a backfire from some heavy equipment that was on the road shoulder, but very quickly I determined there was a whoosh-whoosh compression noise coming from under our hood. I quickly pulled over, and after looking under the hood and not seeing anything obviously amiss we called for a tow.

We were 33 miles from the Camporee campground. The tow truck would only take the truck and trailer to the closest dealership/repair facility; that would have left us stranded until the problem was assessed and fixed. Given we had no idea what it was, the wait could have been considerable. Needless to say, we eventually made it to the fun and festivities thanks to good friends at the Camporee who drove out with their pickup truck to tow us in that evening.

As you have read elsewhere in this issue, the Camporee was a great success. I know we certainly had a lot of fun. Upon learning the following day that our truck's problem was due to a mechanic insufficient torquing of the spark plug during a tune-up that resulted in the plug eventually working free and popping out of the engine block (ever hear of that before?) and that the dealership was back-charging the other dealership where the error occurred (versus us) made for an even better resolution. But the outcome could have been much worse: the insurance policy might have allowed towing only the truck and not the trailer; if we were quite distant from the campground where friends could not rescue us (or traveling on remote country backroads as I normally like to do), we would have incurred a substantial towing fee.

In a previous issue I mentioned one should have a good roadside insurance policy. Some auto insurance companies will write extra-cost riders that cover towing a trailer (like the AAA) while other specialized RV insurance policies (such as those offered by Good Sam) offer the ability to cover both the tow vehicle (a.k.a. truck) and trailer. Having a policy that leaves your trailer stranded at the roadside is not something one wishes to consider, but it is a possibility if your policy does not cover towing both vehicles in the event the tow vehicle (truck) is disabled. As mentioned, a separate tow for the trailer could be a very expensive proposition. I don't think this would be an issue for a Class A or C motorhome with a toad, but it is something to consider double-checking to ensure you are covered.

We had the pleasure of traveling to Canada in the late summer to visit family as well as new friends. I have been working closely (sometimes daily) with our webmaster for the past two years, and it was about time to meet him face-to-face. We chose a weekend that his NSDCA Chapter (C-175, Riverside Gypsy Squares) would be holding a campout/dance. They meet in a delightful campground in southern Ontario situated on Lower Beverly Lake, managed by the village of Delta. We were treated to a hayride tour of the village Friday afternoon, an evening dance in an open pavilion – called by our webmaster, Bob Summers – and a bonfire afterwards. Line dancing was also included in the evening's festivities. Saturday's dance was held in the afternoon, followed by a communal dinner and bonfire. Several dancers hung around through Sunday (including us) and we took the opportunity to tour the village's grist mill (which is on Canada's Register of Historic Sites; see www.deltamill.org), something the Gypsies had done during a previous campout. Ontario really didn't feel like a foreign country to us (other than the metric units posted as speed limits and most signage being in English and French), but on Monday we headed to Montreal to visit family – no square dancing was involved – and we were suddenly transported into a place that no longer felt we were at home. French is the language of record for Quebec province, which sometimes made for interesting (and incorrect) assumptions on our part as to what message was intended when trying to interpret road signs. Getting around Montreal was not a problem, however: they have a wonderful public transit system, and the vast majority of people are fluent in both languages. All in all, it was a thoroughly delightful trip.

And speaking of traveling, someone is apparently looking at what I've been calling the "experimental map" that shows the geographic locations of all NSDCA events that are published on the Association's website in the USA and Canada; there have been over 1,300 views since it has been available. I hope it has been helpful to those who have viewed it to plan to attend other Chapters' campout/dances. If you haven't yet looked at this still-experimental feature, go to the NSDCA website (NSDCA.org), click on the "Camping/Dancing" menu option in the green bar, select "Show Campouts" from the drop-down menu, and then find a button labeled "Maps" in the right margin next to the heading "Visit Campouts". Once you click that you will be taken to the aforementioned experimental map.

The listings are getting thin towards the end of the year (although there are some 2023 events already posted) but the list is continually updated as new campout information is provided by your Chapter. The color code for campout "pins" is as follows: blue for Chapter campouts, orange for a change in venue or cancelled Chapter campout, purple for State/Province Camporees, and red for the International Camporee (with

½ cup shredded cheese (I like sharp cheddar)


1/4 cup sour cream


Michigan State Representative

Helpful Hints: RV Water Heater (part 2)

If you didn't find an energy supply issue using the steps listed in the summer 2022 issue (Volume 60 Issue 3) here is another of the most common problems with an RV water heater and hopefully how to correct it. More will be forthcoming in future issues.

Disclaimer: Working with propane and electricity can be dangerous. Caution must be taken when performing this work. Servicing your RV water heater can be an easy Do-It-Yourself task; however, if you are not comfortable with any of the potential risks, have a professional do this work for you.

Manual Valve Water Heater problem (non-DSI): the pilot won't stay lit

- A. Ensure the thermocouple is screwed in tightly to the gas control valve. If it is loose then tighten it, but be sure not to overtighten or strip the threads.
- B. Visually inspect the thermocouple to ensure it is free of soot and centered in the pilot light's flame. If necessary, use a soft brush (e.g., toothbrush) to remove the soot from the thermocouple; be careful adjusting the thermocouple's position to ensure you don't kink the wire connector or damage the thermocouple itself.

If (A) and (B) are satisfactory, then:


- C. Remove and clean the pilot orifice and flame tube. Note: Only use compressed air to clean an orifice; drill bits, paper clips and other abrasive items can enlarge its opening and damage it beyond repair.
- D. Reassemble the cleaned parts, light the pilot and see if it will stay lit. If not, then:
- E. Test the water heater's thermocouple using a Volt Ohm Meter (VOM) that can read both resistance (in ohms, Ω) and voltage (in millivolts, mV) as follows:
- 1. Disconnect and remove the thermocouple from the water heater gas control valve. Make sure all safety protocols are followed.
- 2. Ensure your test leads are in the appropriate sockets on the meter (i.e., ground and volt/ohm, not amp or milliamp).
- 3. Select the ohms (Ω , resistance) option on your multimeter, preferably using a range that tops out at 50 ohms or use the "X10" scaling factor if available.
- 4. Place one test lead (it does not matter which one) on the side of the thermocouple and touch the other to the end that screws into the gas valve. A small resistance reading should be indicated on the VOM if the thermocouple has proper continuity. Many multimeters also indicate continuity with a squealing sound, but this may not be sufficient to assess the proper resistance of the thermocouple. If the reading on the multimeter indicates the thermocouple does not have continuity,

- it is not usable. A high resistance reading (on the order of 40 ohms) also suggests the thermocouple should be replaced.
- 5. Next, set the multimeter to the DC millivolt (mV) range to perform an open circuit test. You will be looking for a voltage between 25 mV and 30 mV, so choose an appropriate range. Hold one test lead (it does not matter which one) on the side of the thermocouple and touch the other to the inside end that screws into the gas valve. Using either a cigarette lighter, a barbecue lighter or some other source of heat with a flame, hold the flame at the farthest end of the thermocouple (i.e., the end that is normally in the pilot flame). Thermocouples designed for residential gas appliances are designed to output 30 mV when unloaded and they experience a nearby flame-based heat source. The VOM reading should be between 25 mV and 30 mV. Anything reading close to 20 mV or less means the thermocouple should be replaced; use discretion if the reading is between 21 mV and 25 mV.
- 6. Perform a closed-circuit test using a thermocouple adapter (photo); this provides a true indication of performance ability with the thermocouple under load. Gas valve thermocouple adapters are available online and cost anywhere from \$6 up. Be sure to read reviews of the model you are ordering to ensure it provide reputable service. It is easier to perform this test using alligator clips attached to one of the VOM's test leads. First, attach the thermocouple adapter to the gas valve where the thermocouple would normally connect. Then attach the thermocouple to the

adapter. Turn the water heater on and place an alligator clip from the multimeter on the screw that extends from the side of the adapter; hold the other lead at the side of the thermocouple (do not attach the alligator clip to the thermocouple lead, you could damage the thermocouple). Light and hold a flame as done it step 5. The VOM should be set to the same range as used in step 5. The VOM reading should be between 12 mV and 15 mV; anything less than 12 mV indicates the thermocouple is defective and should be replaced.

If the above steps do not correct the problem, you likely have a bad thermocouple or control valve. You can try replacing the thermocouple to see if that fixes the problem. If not, then the issue is more than likely the gas valve. Please note that gas valves are not serviceable and a repair should never be attempted – the valve should be replaced.



A brief update on important NSDCA Rules and Guidelines per NSDCA Standing Rules, Policies and Procedures:


